1. Numbers of full-time faculty include all faculty members reported, including deans and directors who have significant administrative responsibilities, staff not paid according to regular salary scales, staff on leave of absence, and visiting professors.
2. This table includes medical faculty.
3. This table does not reflect the whole size of university faculties since Statistics Canada only counts members whose salaries are paid directly by the universities. Some faculty members, such as clinicians, for example, are paid by external medical research organizations and thus not included in this table.
Beginning in 2014-15 Western University and University of Toronto no longer report clinical faculty.
Beginning in 2015-16, McMaster University, University of Ottawa and Queen's University will no longer report clinical faculty.
4. Not all universities report faculty numbers for other ranks below assistant professors. They are combined into the "all other combined" category.
5. Institutions included: Brock, Carleton, Guelph, Lakehead, Laurentian, McMaster, Nipissing, OCAD U, Ontario Tech, Ottawa, Queen's, Ryerson, Toronto, Trent, Waterloo, Western, WLU, Windsor, and York. Ontario Tech was included beginning in 2007-08 and OCAD U was included beginning in 2009-10.
